

Student Leader Sheds Light on Mental Health

Amaia Parkins '25 united the Converse and Spartanburg communities with our inaugural Out of the Darkness Walk in April. Designed to shed light on the experiences of those who have grappled with mental health challenges, the event also honored Parkins' late brother who died by suicide in 2016.

"I wanted to spark the conversation around this topic and end the stigma, along with telling my own story of personal struggle and mental health," Parkins shared.

More than 200 community members participated, raising more than \$3,000 for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

Cultivating Community

The student experience at Converse is filled with self-discovery, community, and lifelong memories.

Converse's new Director of Student Programming Dallas Witt seeks to enhance student life by providing a creative, supportive environment. "I want our students to know they have a strong support system through me, but I also want to create the best experience possible," Witt says. His role focuses on leadership development, campus organizations and activities, as well as male student retention. His recent projects include organizing Homecoming Week events and coordinating a Data Science Week presentation by Dr. Will Cousins, Vice President of Baseball Development for the Tampa Bay Rays.

Converse also offers tailored resources for first-generation students, who comprised more than 40 percent of our fall 2024 incoming class. Director of First-Generation Programs & Student Success Initiatives Daphnie Glenn provides immersion experiences, mentors, and offers guidance on study skills, financial literacy, and more. "We have a lot of hard-working students who pour into this university to make it what it is," she said. "It's important that we check on them and curate a community they would not otherwise be exposed to." Through donor support, Glenn recently organized a trip for students to see The Lion King and hosted events for National First Gen Week in November.
